friendly website, improved our ability to keep you informed by using MailChimp, and created a new Region banner featuring Laura Smith's lovely piece entitled, "From the Mountains to the Sea."



We found out that there was life after Ridgecrest and, although we were saddened by our loss of that lovely venue after our 2018 retreat, we found that other places also have much to offer. We held a wonderful retreat in Flat Rock, NC, in 2019 and a great seminar in Clemmons in the fall of 2021. We also tried our hand at some virtual retreats during the pandemic and found that we could learn, take classes, and enjoy good old-fashioned stitch-ins from the comfort of our own homes.

In addition, we revised the Region's job descriptions and totally revamped the responsibilities of the ARD so that we could create the new position of Seminar Director. We also updated some of our teaching and reimbursement policies. When we hold our Board of Directors (BoD) meeting this coming June, we will ask the voters to approve the newly-revised Policies and Procedures.

We entered the world of trade shows by setting up a booth at the Original Sewing and Quilt Show last fall. That endeavor led to the development of a festival kit that chapters can borrow for free when they host a booth at a pre-approved trade show, festival, or similar event. At our upcoming Board of Directors meeting, we will ask for approval of a motion to also provide a small subsidy to chapters who host such a booth.

Last fall, we started developing a new plan to increase membership and enhance member participation. Called IDEA (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Accessibility), this effort grew out of the plans being developed by EGA National to re-engineer the entire organization to better meet the needs of our members and to attract new members. Gail Smith and Sue Osterberg volunteered to join me as members of the CAR IDEA Team steering committee. We held our kick-off meeting with our chapters this past January to exchange ideas about what all of us can do. I charged the chapters to take on one new marketing activity and to report on what they did at our upcoming BoD meeting.

I am proud of all we have accomplished, but perhaps the area that gives me the greatest satisfaction is knowing that we were able to hold together during the pandemic through the use of ZOOM and other innovative methods. I am eternally grateful to Marge Kelly, our current National Vice President, who taught the RDs how to use ZOOM. I am also grateful to those of you who took up the challenge to join me in our variety of ZOOM events and who used ZOOM or other methods to keep your chapters going when it was unsafe to meet in person. I was touched and gratified by your enthusiasm and support for our virtual events and by your attendance at them. Together, we made it through the pandemic and, I believe, came out of it stronger as a Region.

I will have been your RD for almost four-and-a-half years by the time my term ends. Although at times it was difficult for me to attend to the business at hand, serving as your Region Director has been one of the most gratifying experiences of my life. I have met many wonderful members who have become very close friends. I have also learned that my odd assortment of past education, jobs, and experiences really did come in handy after all.

I did my best to represent our Region as your liaison with National EGA and brought back ideas that I learned from other Region Directors in an effort to enhance our own work and experiences. Learning more about EGA at those National meetings made me understand and appreciate the organization even more.

When I first took on the role of Assistant Region Director at Janet Noble's request when Karla Gee resigned in Sep-

Perceptions and Words:

There is a movement in the air. In fact, it has been there just below our consciousness for some time. A movement of sorts, not really something you can see clearly, even wearing 'readers', it is just something inside us and out in the world around us. It is the re-awakening of life and the possibilities to come.

Just what is possible today? Maybe the better question is what is not possible today? Ah, but that is a negative question, so let's stick with the positive one, alright? In fact, it is that perception of trying to frame the negative as a positive, that is a possibility. I try to use words that can describe bad or ugly situations in a little more positive manner. What I am trying to do, is to have a more positive mental view of the world.

The first change I made was about 2 decades ago! It was nothing big & grand. It was just a little word change, and I have found over these past 2 decades it has made a difference. It has made a difference in my perception of the world immediately around me; it has made a bigger difference in the manner I view events that stop me from going or doing what I wanted to do. What did I do? I removed the word 'problem' from my vocabulary. That's not to say they don't exist or don't happen to me, I have just changed their name to 'Challenge(s)'.

It wasn't until a few years into my word change phase, that I realized

there is a physical change along with the 2 words. Say the word 'problem'. What does your face & mouth do? Does your face get a little tight? Does your mouth pucker up a bit? Try it a couple of times. Did it happen to you? Now say the word 'challenge'. What happened? What did your mouth do? For the majority of us, your mouth made an almost-to-full smile. WHAT? Try it again. There is just something about that word that you end up smiling at the end of saying it. And what about your facial muscles? Did they tighten up or were they just there on your face?

Somehow, by using the word 'challenge' whatever it is/was that stopped me from going forward with MY plan, it is a bit easier to solve. That concept of not being able to solve a problem is turned on its head, in my mind, and I know I am up to a challenge. I will grow, I will learn from a challenge. It is just how I preserve the power of those 2 words, and by choosing the more positive word, my life has gotten a tad bit easier.

In a little different area, I have tried to slow down my ability to jump to conclusions & reasons. I am trying to understand why something is done the way its done. What are the benefits for this action? What happened before that resulted in this action today?

Trying to keep a positive attitude, especially when I want to have a 'bad' attitude, has made my life easier,

mostly, but I see that it has helped others I encounter during my times wandering around outside.

Giving away a smile does make a difference. I was walking to my car in a parking lot & not feeling so good. Suddenly, a car of young men went past me & a guy in the backseat, looked out his window & smiled so very big, right. At. Me. He looked me in the eye, he saw me & he smiled. When they parked, I had to tell that young man what a difference he had made in my day going forward & I thanked him.



Now for the homework. What? What did you think, that I was going to let you go & not give you a challenge? This is easy, even for those of us who are introverts. The next time you are in a chapter meeting or stitching with friends, share a smile with them. Listen with all your being to them talking to you. Just listen, hear their story/words. And give them your smile.

Videos, searches, & an exhibit to enter

Videos for 2022 National Seminar in New York City –

There is still time to register to attend the EGA National Seminar to be held August 24 – 28, 2022, in New York City. There are many enticing courses to choose from. To make the selection easier for you (and to tempt you even more!), the seminar committee has asked each teacher to include a short video about their pieces. What a wonderful idea! To see the videos and gain a better appreciation of each piece, go to the EGA National website Events page and click on Broadway Bound. Once you access the class descriptions and give the system a little time to load, you will see a link for the video on the page for each class. It will be hard to resist registering! Go on – you know you want to be there!!

EGA National Website Searches – After hearing a lot of concerns about how to effectively search the website, EGA National has revised their search engine. Now your searches will produce a listing of all items on the site that reflect your search term, categorized for easy reference. This will make it easier for you to select the exact listing that you are looking for.

As an example, let us say that you want to find the pamphlet about blackwork that you saw a few months ago but you cannot remember what it was called or where you found it. If you type **blackwork** in the search bar, you will come up with a number of options. These options will be divided into 5 categories: Pages, Courses, Blogs, Document Downloads, and Products. In my example, we are looking for a pamphlet, so we can go right to the Document Download section to find what we want. However, if we were not sure what type of resource we needed, we could look through all of the entries until we found what we were looking for.

Searching on the website has been much improved. Give it a try the next time you want to find something!



The National Exhibit: Through the Needle's Eye (TNE) – Calling all stitchers! The EGA's National Exhibit is looking for your original or adapted needlework piece for its 22nd National Exhibit. As explained on the EGA website, "TNE is EGA's National embroidery exhibit of original needlework of the highest quality. It is Through the Needles Eye that EGA embraces traditional and contemporary needlework while expanding the perception of embroidery as an art form."

While in previous years this exhibit traveled around the country for three years, this time the show will be presented virtually in a museum-like setting available for free through the EGA website. The exhibit will officially premiere at the 2023 National Seminar in Boston. The pieces will also be physically displayed for three months at EGA Headquarters in Louisville once the show opens.

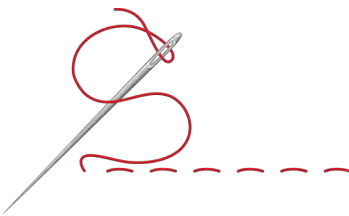
FromRoyalSchoolOfNeedlework

An exciting free resource for stitchers!

Did you know that there is a wonderful free resource available to stitchers, sponsored by the Royal School of Needlework (RSN)? They have produced a very helpful bank of 225 stitches that demonstrates how to make each stitch, categorizes the stitches in a number of different ways for easy reference, and suggests other references that you might want to check. This site is perfect for beginning stitchers who have never used a particular stitch before as well as advanced stitchers who need a refresher. People who want to find the perfect stitch to fill in an area can also find an easy way to look for a particular kind of stitch.

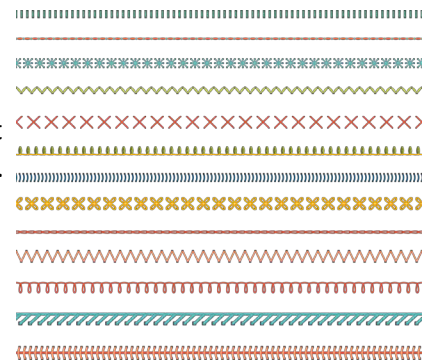


If you take a few minutes to explore the site before you need to use it, you will find a wealth of information that is sure to make your future stitching sessions much more productive (and less

frustrating)! Below are some of the features of the site:

Browse the Stitch Wall – If you select this menu item, you will see an alphabetical listing of all 225 stitches currently in the database. Click on one of the icons to see the details about that stitch including some background information and step-by-step instructions about how to actually make the stitch. The photos and explanations are very clear and easy to follow. At the bottom of the column of still photos describing each step, there is a video that demonstrates the stitch. You can also see lists of related stitches, references, and other helpful information about the stitch.

My Stitches – You can create your own personal file (“My Stitches”) of the stitches that you refer to frequently. To add a stitch to your own personal file, simply open the stitch page and look for the rectangular purple/blue button that says + **MY STITCHES** (the plus sign will be in a circle). Click on that button. Then, when you later access the MY STITCHES menu option, you will see that that stitch has been added to your file. The next time you want to refer to that stitch, instead of searching through all of the stitches on the site, you can just go back to MY STITCHES and click on that stitch.



Embroidery Techniques – This section provides explanations of 25 different techniques and provides some other helpful information. For example, it may give you a list of stitches used in that technique and a list of references for more study. It also names some related techniques that you can explore.

Stitch Structure – This section gives you options to search for a stitch by type of structure (for example, composite stitches, whipped stitches, detached stitches, etc.). This helpful method of organization makes it easier to search for a type of stitch if you do not know its exact name or for suggestions if you want to use a type of stitch but are not sure which one would work best.

The RSN is continuing to add new stitch pages and invite you to sponsor this work. There is information on the website to explain how you can adopt a stitch. (If you browse the list of sponsors, you will find the names of several EGA chapters among the donors. Wouldn't that be an interesting venture for your chapter?)
